## Calculation of thermodynamic properties

#### Interactions:

- magnetic dipole-dipole
- RKKY (indirect exchange interaction)





### Numerical simulation:

- 12 spins, randomly distributed
- Hamiltonian matrix
  - numeric diagonalization
- energy eigenvalues

- signal size can be predicted!

## Optimized Detector Design

- Application requires:
  - Absorber size  $\rightarrow$  heat capacity
  - Operating temperature
- Sensor material (e.g. Au:Er):
  - Landé-factor: g
  - RKKY-interaction: **a**
- Optimization of sensitivity



- sensor parameters:
- diameter, thickness
- spin concentration
- magnetic field



• Sensitivity (S =  $\Delta \Phi / \Delta E$ ):

$$S_{\rm max} = 1.2 \times 10^{-9} \left(\frac{g}{C_{\rm Abs} \ \alpha \ T^2}\right)^{1/3} \frac{\Phi_0}{\rm eV}$$

## Alternative Geometries

#### coupling depends on spin position

Meanders, multiple loops, miniature coils, ...



#### Sensitivity **dF**/**dE**:

- almost independent of absorber heat capacity
- roughly proportional to the invence of stu

inverse of stucture width

### 2eV X-Ray Detector Pixel

- Temperature: 50mK
- Absorber:  $250 \times 250 \times 5 \ \mu m^3$ , gold
  - heat capacity: 1 pJ/K
  - quantum efficiency: > 98% (6keV)
- ➡• Sensor:
  - **Au**:Er 900ppm, Ø 52μm, h=6.5μm
  - Sensitivität:
    - 0,12  $\Phi_0$  / keV
  - Relaxation times:

Energy resolution:

- rise: < 10<sup>-6</sup>s
- decay: 10<sup>-3</sup>s

$$\Delta E_{FWHM} \cong 1.4 \text{ eV}$$





SQUID noise and Johnson noise: 20% increase

### Two-Stage SQUID Magnetometer



- Detector SQUID read out by a current-sensor SQUID
- Two-stage setup allows for:
  - Low noise
  - Large bandwidth / Slewrate
  - Small power dissipation on detector SQUID chip (Voltage bias)



### Two-Pixel Detector

SQUID Gradiometer With Two Sensors

two Au: Er 300 ppm sensors

 $\varnothing$  50  $\mu$ m, h = 25  $\mu$ m

magnetic field 3 mT

two gold absorbers: 160 x 160 x 5  $\mu$ m<sup>3</sup>

Detector SQUID: commercial SQUID chip M.B. Ketchen, IBM 1992

Amplifier SQUID: IPHT-Jena

SQUID-Electronics (IPHT-Jena): voltage noise: 0.3nV/√Hz very low temperature dependence

ADR: VeriCold Technologies, Munich

21 mK base temperature, holdtime below 30 mK: 2 days

Resolution is ,constant' over the whole energy range Small temperature drifts Small position dependence

#### Observations: temperature independent (30 mK ... 4 K) magnetic field independent (0 ... 35 G) concentration dependence ?

volume dependence ?

Contribution to the energy resolution: 2 eV
